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LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends and Members of the GSA,

I hope that you are all enjoying a productive and enjoyable summer. I know that the past six months have created new uncertainties for many of you as they have for the GSA's leadership and staff.

For those of you traveling to GSA 2025 in Arlington from outside the U.S., you may need to fill out additional paperwork. Because these requirements seem to be changing all the time, please contact your local U.S. consulate for the most up-to-date information. If you don't have friends or family in the US to name as contacts, you may name me as the contact person for the ESTA application (phone number +1 737-274-8692). The address at the conference hotel is 1700 Richmond Hwy, Arlington, VA 22202. I can also provide a letter of invitation from the GSA if needed. If you request one, please remember to include your institutional affiliation, address, your roles at the GSA conference (paper presenter, moderator, commentator, seminar participant, etc.), and the titles of your panels, papers, and/or seminars in which you will participate.

A number of you have written to ask why the GSA simply doesn't make it an option to present virtually. I realize that this seems an elementary solution for each individual, but it just isn't feasible on the scale of a conference this large. The amount of labor involved in preparing a large hybrid conference at short notice is beyond our means. The GSA has one employee (I am still a faculty member at my university). Moreover, the cost of such a change is prohibitive. There are three levels of expense (apart from labor): contracting for the infrastructure to hold a hybrid event; paying for the expanded internet capacity on-site that would be needed; and then, if sufficient numbers of members would choose to participate remotely rather than in person, facing the prospect of leaving the minimum number of hotel rooms we have contracted to fill for the event unfilled, which would leave the GSA responsible for paying for those (empty) rooms out of our funds.

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR (CONT.)

My rough estimate is that this would more than double the cost of running the conference and thus require a significant increase in the registration fees.

For example, the costs for a smaller-than-usual conference in 2024 (plus a hurricane) came to roughly \$250,000. Registration fees did not completely cover that sum, and the difference had to come out of the association's reserves.

These are the reasons we plan to try to carry on with an in-person event as planned. I hope as many of you as possible will attend. That said, your physical safety is crucial. Josh and I will work with all members on their individual circumstances if the situation causes them to cancel their participation.

As a scholar of nineteenth-century civil society and voluntary associations, it is an odd feeling to suddenly realize that my work is relevant, but here we are. As the Verein-GSA plans to convene, I look forward to welcoming you to Virginia. Our collective commitment to scholarship and to spending time with each other sustains our shared belief in the importance of the humanities and the free exchange of ideas.

GSA 2025 MENTORING INITIATIVES

Given the success of last year's program, the Mentoring Award and Initiatives Committee will offer 1:1 mentoring sessions again at this year's GSA Conference in Arlington, VA. These sessions are for mentoring at all career stages. Possible topics include: the job market (academic jobs and careers alongside and beyond academia), early career concerns, mid-career concerns, publishing, transitioning from a faculty to an administrative role. Mentors and mentees may use the following forms to sign up for 30-minute time slots on Friday and Saturday from 9am–5pm and on Sunday from 9am–11am.

The mentoring committee is pleased to report that over 60 PhD students, recent graduates, and faculty mentors participated in its first virtual workshop on navigating the academic job search. The ninety-minute workshop addressed job outlooks, types of faculty positions and institutions, how to read a job announcement, basic elements of the job application, process and calendar (what happens when, from the announcement to the offer), and preparing for other types of jobs inside and outside of the university. Panelists included **Elizabeth Loentz** (Germanic Studies, University of Illinois Chicago), **Catriona MacLeod** (Germanic Studies, University of Chicago), **David Meola** (History, University of South Alabama), **Christine Rinne** (German, University of South Alabama), **Liz Schoppelrei** (German Studies, Society for the Humanities, Cornell University).

In response to feedback from attendees, the committee plans to offer a virtual workshop in Spring 2026 on advice for early career academics. This workshop will discuss topics such as how to stay active in a one-year position, how to thrive at different types of institutions (from teaching heavy to R1), service expectations, how to transition from a non-academic job to an early academic career path, and how to chart a path to promotion and/or tenure. GSA CONFERENCE ACCESSIBILITY GUIDELINES

These guidelines have been developed by the GSA Accessibility Task Force as part of the association's commitment to improving conference accessibility. They include small things all of us can do to make the conferences spaces for equitable and active engagement for all body minds. Below you find Accessibility Guidelines to be used by conference panelists, participants, and organizers. Implementing these guidelines will help to break down existing power imbalances and lessen barriers that are burdensome to disabled people but invisible for most able-bodied and able-minded participants.

1. Conference Accessibility Etiquette

- Elevators might be strained during peak times. If you are physically able to take the stairs, consider doing so to increase access to the elevator for people who need it.
- If there is a limited number of chairs available during a reception or similar, consider the needs of other people before occupying them. When making hotel reservations, do not reserve an accessible room unless you need it.

2. Panel Accessibility

a. Panel Planning and Presentations

- Panel organizers should encourage panel participants to provide 5 large print copies
 of their talk. (If presenters would like their copies back after the talk-panel, they
 should indicate where to return these handouts and papers)
- If the participants intend to use handouts, make 5 large print copies available and avoid printing handouts on colored paper.
- If possible, the panel participants should discuss what presentation style is most comfortable for everyone before the beginning of the panel (podium or seated at table).
- Presenters should speak loudly and clearly, at a pace that allows the audience to follow the presented arguments.
- If a microphone is available, presenters should always use the microphone.
- Ensure that the question and answer period is accessible. If there is a microphone
 for questioners, make sure they use it. Otherwise, repeat the questions, so everyone
 can hear them.

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GSA CONFERENCE ACCESSIBILITY GUIDELINES (CONT.)

- Keep the aisles clear, so that audience members with mobility devices can navigate it.
- Some people read lips, so the audience should have a direct and clear view of the speaker's mouth and face.

b. Electronic Accessibility

- If using a presentation software (Power Point, Google Slides, or similar), use Alternative Text (content) and Captions (purpose) which help more of your audience access your presentation. (Instructions for alt text in Power Point and Google Slides; instructions for subtitles in Power Point, and Google Slides).
- Use color combinations that are high contrast and that can be distinguished by those who are colorblind.
- Keep your design simple.
- Minimize the amount of text on slides. When you advance a slide, pause to let people read it before saying anything.
- Read the text on the slide to make sure audience members who are visually impaired can follow along.
- Audio presentations should also be described.
- If presenters show images, they should verbally describe them.
- If presenters show quotations, they should be numbered and presenters should make 5 large-print handouts with those quotations available to the audience.

3. Rooms are set up in advance of the conference so all of these guidelines are met. We ask for your cooperation in maintaining this setup.

- A table from where presenters can speak should be available, even if there is a podium in the room.
- Rows should be set up with enough space to accommodate audience members with mobility devices. Please do not change this room setup.

<u>Telescope Film</u> is a resource for finding international film online. It offers a database of over 700,000 titles and one-click access to nearly 270 streaming services, as well as curation to help users discover new film and video content from around the world. The site is free to use.

Telescope also offers dedicated pages for film and TV <u>from Germany</u>, <u>Austria</u>, and <u>Switzerland</u> that showcase narrative features, documentaries, animation, shorts, and series. It also provides access to a database of more than 30,000 German films and coproductions, with information about streaming availability in the US.

OUR FAVORITE THINGS IN DC 2025

Eat Ethiopian food! DC has the world's largest Ethiopian community outside of Africa, so the area has fantastic Ethiopian restaurants. My favorite is Chercher on 9th Street NW (accessible from the conference hotel by taking the yellow line from Crystal City to Mt Vernon Sq).



For those wanting to grab food closer to the conference hotel, I would recommend heading to National Landing Water Park. This outdoor food court is located less than a 10min walk from the conference hotel and features great options for a quick meal: Falafel inc has lighter meals like falafel sandwiches and bowls around the \$5 mark or try Call Your Mother—a DC bagel staple. In addition, there are a number of more formal restaurants at National Landing, for those who prefer full-service restaurants.



As of summer 2025, you no longer need a SmarTrip card to ride the metro. You can now use your contactless credit or debit card at the turnstile. If you plan to ride the bus (either the ART in Arlington or the WMATA buses in DC), however, you will still need a SmarTrip card, which can be purchased at any metro station, or to pay in cash.

OUR FAVORITE THINGS IN DC 2025 (CONT.)



Of all the classic tourist sights (Arlington Cemetery, the White House, the Smithsonian museums, the Capitol, Library of Congress, etc), I thoroughly recommend visiting the monuments on the National Mall. From the conference hotel, you can access the area by taking the blue line metro from Crystal City to Smithsonian. I find the best time to wander around the monuments is in the evening, it will allow you to avoid the crowds and see the monuments illuminated.



If you fancy grabbing some fresh air without straying too far from the conference hotel, you can check out Mount Vernon Trail. The 18-mile multi-use trail connects Arlington to George Washington's estate Mount Vernon. A 30min walk from the conference hotel, you can follow the trail from National Landing north to Gravelly Point. Gravelly Point is a green area, popular for picnics, where you can sit out and watch planes fly right overhead as they come in to land at Ronald Reagan National Airport.
