

GERMAN STUDIES ASSOCIATION

The German Studies Association is a national and international association of scholars in all fields of German studies. Its interest spans the period from early times to the present Federal Republic of Germany, German Democratic Republic, Austria, and Switzerland. A multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary organization, the Association welcomes as members individuals whose interests involve specific or broad aspects of history, literature, politics, and government, and other fields relating to German-speaking Europe. Members of the Association receive the *German Studies Review*, the *Newsletter*, the Conference Program, and all other publications.

The Association holds an annual conference, usually in early October. A Call for Papers is issued in the winter of the preceding year, and the deadline for submissions of proposals is announced for the following spring. A Conference Program is sent to each member.

Membership in the Association is US\$16 per calendar year for members residing in the United States, CAN\$20 for members residing in Canada, and DM50 for all others. To apply for membership, complete the form in the centerfold of this Program, and send it, together with your check, to the Secretary-Treasurer at the address indicated.

Institutional membership in the Association is available at \$100 per year. Members may obtain institutional membership forms from the Secretary-Treasurer for their university or college.

Newsletter

The Association publishes a *Newsletter* containing news of the Association, professional news, information about grants, research opportunities, information about computers and software for academic users, films and classroom aids, major resource collections and archival reports, job opportunities, reviews of current literature and textbooks, and other news. Members are invited to contribute material for the *Newsletter*.

GENERAL INFORMATION

LOCATION

The conference will be held in the Marriott's Pavilion Hotel, One Broadway, St. Louis, Missouri 63102 (corner of Broadway and Market Street; across from Busch Stadium). The hotel is located in the downtown area in St. Louis, in walking distance to the river front with the arch. Rooms for conference participants are available at the reduced rate of \$55 for singles and for doubles. The hotel will guarantee these rates for reservations made through September 15, 1987. After that date, reduced rates will be applied on a space available basis. Reservations should be made directly with Marriott's Pavilion Hotel, telephone: (314) 421-1776. You may also use Marriott's central reservation, by calling their toll-free number (800) 228-9290. In order to secure the reduced rate, it is necessary to identify yourself as a registrant in the German Studies Association Conference.

International participants are urged to write the hotel AIR MAIL to book reservations, and to send a copy of the letter to Prof. Lützeler, Local Arrangements Director. The letter should be sent so that it will arrive before the deadline. GERMAN passengers may telephone within Germany at local rates (Ortsgespräch) to the Marriott international reservation desk at 0130-4422. Then, book your reservation and GET A CONFIRMATION NUMBER! You must identify yourself as a registrant in the German Studies Association Conference in order to get the reduced rate.

TRANSPORTATION

By Air

Lambert Airport in St. Louis is served by international, national, and regional carriers. The Marriott's Pavilion Hotel has a limousine service available from the Airport. It is operated by Hollander Corporation and is called Jet Port Limo Service (314) 427-8199 and costs are \$6.00 each way. The run approximately every 20 minutes and are located outside the lower level adjacent to the luggage carousels (exit 13).

TWA is the Official Airline of the German Studies Association for the 1987 St. Louis Conference.

For domestic passengers: TWA offers special discounts plus bonus Frequent Flyer miles if you or your travel agent book through our special telephone number. To get the special fare, give the GSA Identification Number when booking a resevervation. Our ID Number is 9913517. The special telephone numbers are (800) 325-4933, in Missouri call (800) 392-1673; in St. Louis call (314) 291-5589. When you have flown TWA this way, pick up your bonus mileage sticker at the GSA Registration Desk at Marriott's Pavilion Hotel in St. Louis.

For international passengers: The special Identification Number and fare discounts do not apply to international passengers because of IATA regulations. However, you will be able to get 2000 bonus Frequent Flyer miles. If you are

not already a member of the TWA Frequent Flyer Program, pick up a registration form when you check your baggage for departure. Book your TWA flight through your local travel agency or call TWA:

There is a new TWA service directly from Berlin. International passengers will want to know that some TWA flights fly nonstop to St. Louis. Also, TWA has their own international arrival building at JFK New York Airport, and their own customs clearance, and their own domestic building next door. If you fly TWA over New York, after clearing customs, simply drop your bag at the TWA drop-off, and it will be automatically sent to your domestic TWA domestic flight. Then, just walk through the corridor to the TWA domestic building next door. TWA also offers special VUSA (visit USA) fares for further travel within the USA. These fares are available only by advance purchase in Europe, and tickets must be purchased before departure. At press time, the fare is DM 540 to anywhere in the 48 adjacent states. Additional flight coupons are DM 149 each. Ask your travel agent.

International participants are reminded that the United States is not a member of the European banking consortium. Therefore, Euroschecks are not accepted by banks or by hotels, restaurants, shops, etc. You are advised to bring traveller's checks in US dollars. It is also useful to bring a credit card when travelling in the United States. Among credit cards widely used are Eurocard (Master Card), Master Card, VISA, American Express, and Diner's Club.

All Participants: The official travel agency for the German Studies Association 1987 St. Louis Conference is Universal Travel of Tempe, Arizona. Universal Travel will happily book your reservations, issue your tickets, and provide you with appropriate invoices if you are seeking reimbursement. If you book directly through TWA, you may either pick up the tickets yourself at a TWA counter or ask them to have Universal Travel mail them to you, or use your own travel agency. Of course, you may use your own travel agency if you like, but Universal Travel is available if you wish and is experienced in national and international travel. By Car

The hotel is located near Highway 40 (I-70). Take the Broadway exit which is the last exit on Highway 40 in the state of Missouri. (If you miss this exit you

will cross the Mississippi to end up in Illinois.) Make two left turns and go to Market Street. (The hotel is located at the corner of Broadway and Market Street.)

By Train

St. Louis can be reached by Amtrak from all directions.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Participants are urged to register as early as possible. Pre-registration at a special reduced rate will be available through September 15, 1987.

Pre-registration for current members is \$25. Regular registration for current members is \$35. Non-member registration is \$45. Non-members who wish to join the Association may use the New Membership Form included in this program. Non-members may join now at the regular annual rate of \$16 and become eligible for the reduced registration fee. They also receive all publications of the Association for 1987. Students with a valid identification card may register for \$10.

Luncheons are scheduled for Friday and Saturday, and the Banquet of the Association will be held Friday evening. Attendance of these functions is by advance reservation only, and tickets should be ordered and paid for by check at the time of pre-registration. After September 15, tickets will be sold on a space-available basis only. The price of each luncheon is \$12, and the banquet is \$25.

TOURIST INFORMATION

St. Louis with its 2.5 million residents is the oldest metropolis of the Midwest. Its downtown area has been revitalized during the last fifteen years, and major attractions are the Arch (Jefferson Memorial) with its museum about the discovery of the West; Laclede Landing at the riverfront with its numerous show boats and many restaurants; the St. Louis Center (a "post-modern" shopping center), and the renovated St. Louis Union Station. These attractions are in walking distance to the hotel. If you have the time to leave the downtown area you might like to visit the St. Louis Art Museum in Forest Park (built in 1904

on the occasion of the St. Louis World's Fair). One of the major attractions of this museum is its expressionist (Max Beckmann) and modernist collection.

Information about cruises on the Mississippi will be available in the registration area.
