GENERAL INFORMATION

LOCATION

The conference hotel is the Los Angeles Airport Marriott, located a short drive from LAX, the Los Angeles International Airport, at 5855 W. Century Boulevard, Los Angeles, California 90045. Rooms are available at the reduced conference rate of \$68 single and double. These rates do not include state and local occupancy taxes. To make a reservation, write to the hotel or call the hotel directly at 213-641-5700, or you may call toll-free within the United States at 1-800-228-9290. In order to receive the reduced conference rate, it is necessary to identify yourself as making a reservation for the German Studies Association Conference. The hotel will guarantee these rates until **September 9, 1991** after which reduced rates for our conference will be available only on a space-available basis. Therefore, it is important to make reservations early. The Association's block of rooms will be released on September 10.

The hotel offers complementary airport pick-up service. Their mini-vans cruise the airport every ten minutes twenty-four hours a day. It is not necessary to call for pick-up. Just go outside, and wait at the green section ("Hotel and Motel vans"), for the mini-van from the hotel. It is easily identified.

TRANSPORTATION**By Air**

The official airline of the Association is **American Airlines**. American Airlines flies to Los Angeles from many cities in the United States. International service via American Airlines connections is available from Canada and American Airlines flies to Los Angeles from Europe via Chicago or Dallas-Fort Worth.

American Airlines is the official carrier of the German Studies Association.

Domestic participants: As our official airline, American Airlines offers a five percent discount off the lowest published fare for all participants in the German Studies Association Annual Conference or forty percent off the regular non-restricted fare. This is a very competitive fare price. AA is also helping the GSA with the Conference. Therefore, it is helpful if members fly the official airline.

How to book on American Airlines: You may book your discounted ticket the same way you always book and purchase tickets. All that you have to do is to give your travel agent our special **Star Number** to qualify for the fare reduction. If your travel agent does not know how to do it, simply ask her/him to call the AA Convention Desk for information. You can do it yourself by calling the Convention Desk toll-free at 1-800-433-1790. Our special **Star Number** is **S02Z1QJ**.

Transatlantic Participants. In accordance with IATA regulations, AA does not provide discounts as for domestic passengers. However, they do offer AAdvantage frequent flyer miles. For members of the Association/participants in the conference, AA will award a **bonus of 5,000 AAdvantage frequent flier miles** for one transatlantic trip in 1991. To receive this special bonus, all you have to do is send the Association headquarters in Arizona a xerox copy of the ticket

stub that you have flown, showing date, class flown, and price. Be sure to include your AAdvantage number. The 5,000 bonus miles are in addition to the frequent flier miles that you will otherwise receive for the travel. Presently, only 20,000 frequent flier miles are needed for a round-trip domestic free ticket. Most of their international flights are modern 767s. To reserve an American Airlines international flight in Germany, call AA direct in Frankfurt at 069-230591. Elsewhere in western Germany, you can be charged local telephone rates if you call 0130-4114. American Airlines flies from Munich and Frankfurt. You can get a connecting American Airlines flight from Düsseldorf, through Lufthansa.

Join the AAdvantage Frequent Flier Program! A membership form is enclosed with this Conference Program.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL INTERNATIONAL PARTICIPANTS! The United States is not a member of the European Banking Consortium. Eurocheques are not accepted by American banks or by hotels, restaurants, shops, etc. Some banks will make an exception, sometimes for a fee. Rates vary. If you must convert a Eurocheque, write it out in Deutsche Marks, not U.S. dollars. The European banks do not recognize Eurocheques in dollars! Thus, an American bank may accept a Eurocheque for conversion at the dollar-mark rate with or without a fee or may decline to accept it at all. If it is written in dollars, expect a fee of up to 40%. Experienced European travellers bring traveller's checks (available in any European bank). Either dollar or DM traveller's checks are generally accepted by banks. Traveller's checks in dollars are accepted by hotels, restaurants, and shops. Los Angeles International Airport offers facilities to convert European currency. Credit cards are another good way to pay. They are widely used in the United States. The most popular are MasterCard, Visa, and Eurocard (which is MasterCard). Less popular are Diner's Club and American Express.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Pre-registration by mail

Pre-registration at the reduced rate is available for members of the Association whose membership is in good standing as of July 1, 1991. Persons who join the Association after that date pay the non-member rate. A registration form is enclosed with this program and should be used to facilitate registration by mailing it before the deadline. Pre-registrants may pick up their registration packet at the GSA Registration Desk. Pre-registration for members as of July 1, 1991 is \$35. Regular registration, after pre-registration has closed, is available for members as of July 1 at the rate of \$40. Pre-registration for non-

members is the same as regular registration, \$50. Pre-registration for the conference is available with the form in this program until September 10, 1991.
